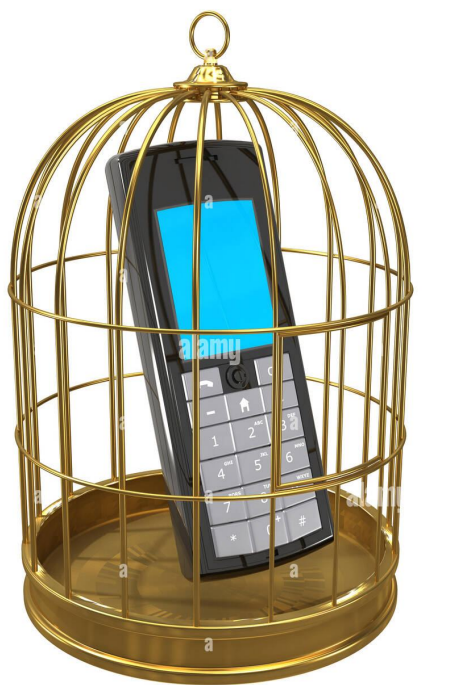
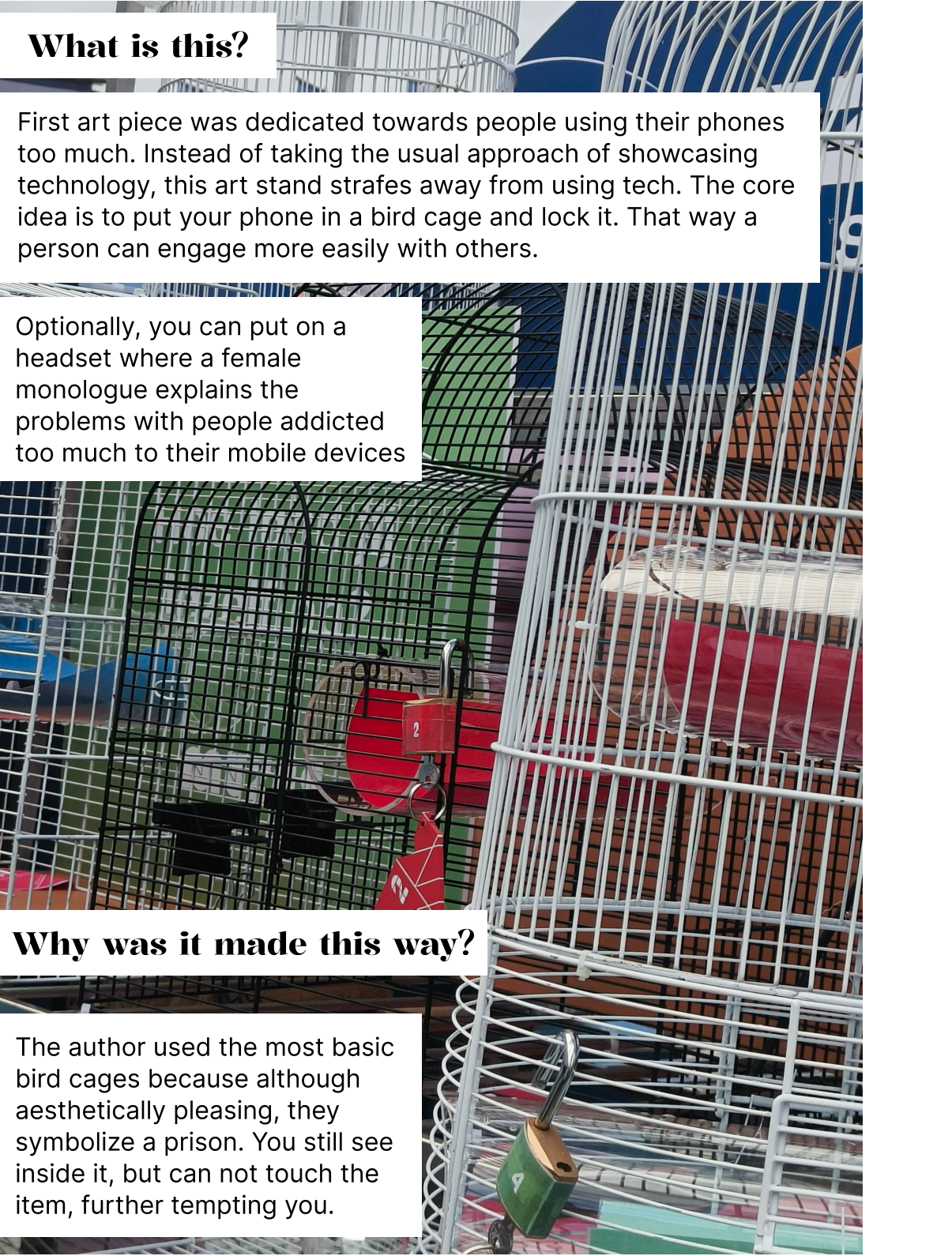


Your phone is controlling you?



Simply cage it!



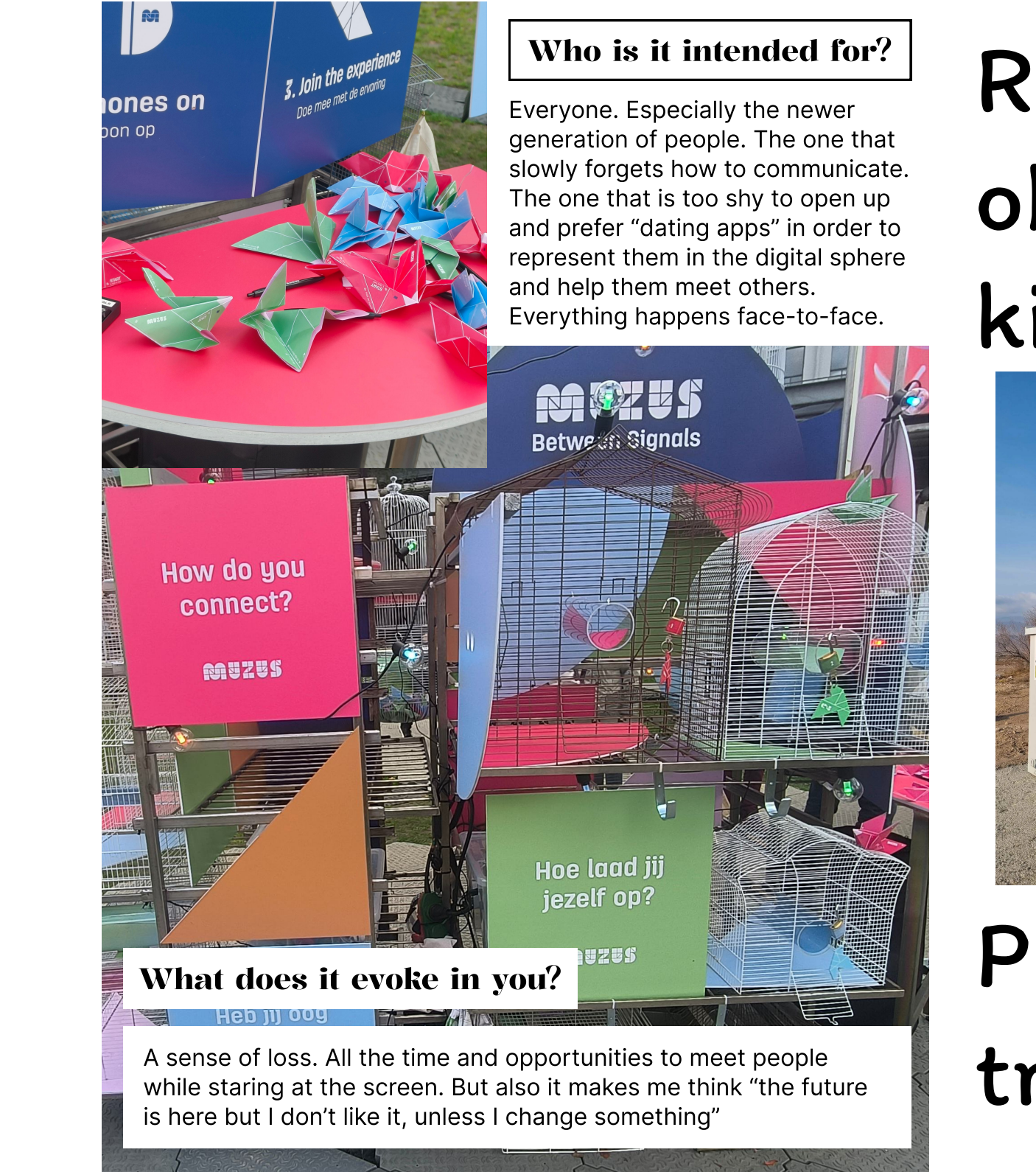
What is this?

Why was it made this way?

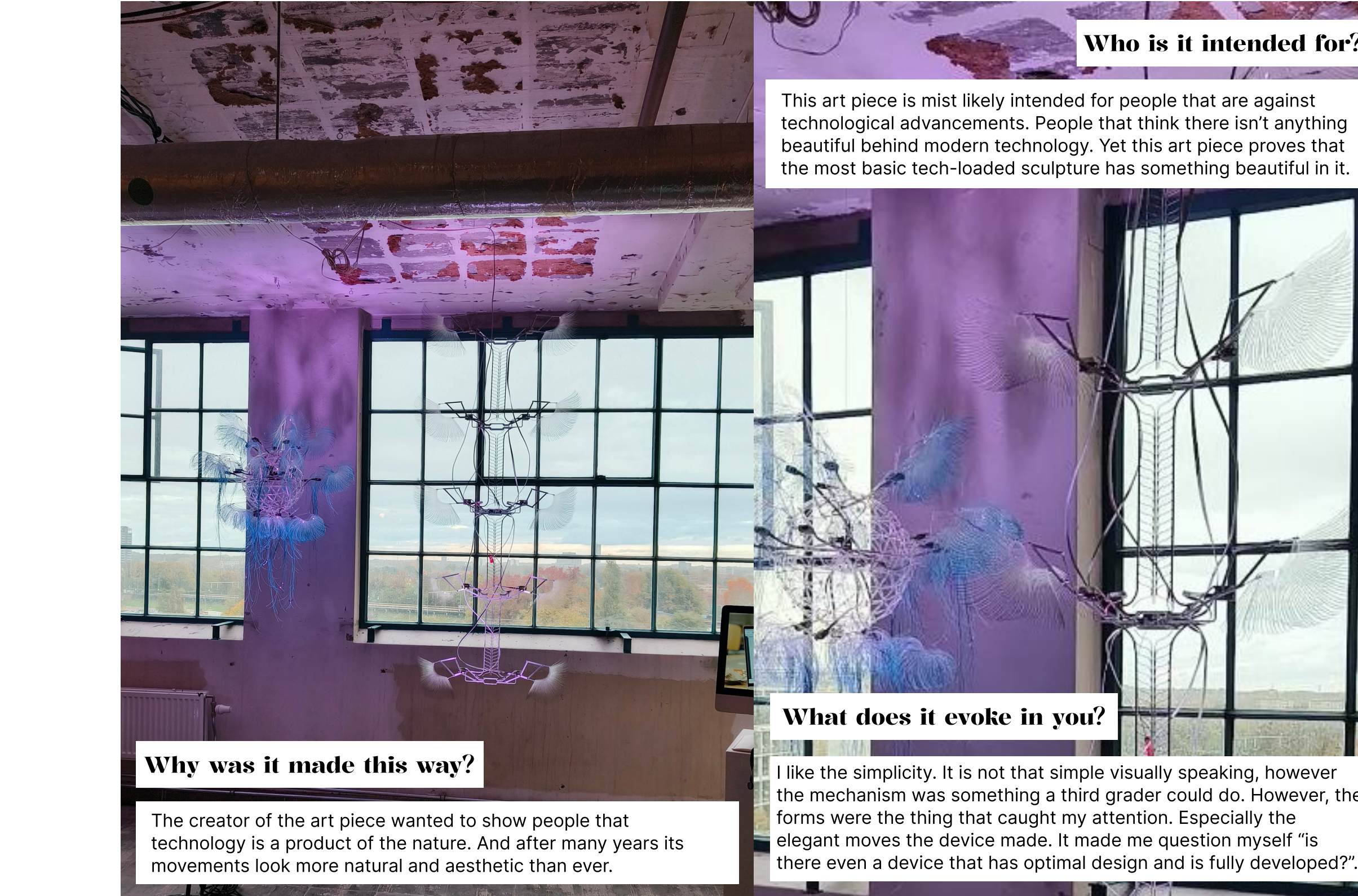
The creator wanted to show the average person how combining two entirely different things can actually turn out into something not so useless and that way provoke them to experiment.
